


WORLD CHILDREN'S DAY: SCHOOL ASSEMBLY

PURPOSE OF THE ASSEMBLY PRESENTATION

The aim is to 'paint the big picture' that World Children's Day provides a great opportunity to celebrate that all children around the world have rights as outlined in the Convention on the Rights of the Child and Unicef's role in upholding children's rights. As the school is part of the RRSA programme, pupils are likely to be aware of several rights but depending upon what stage the school is at with the Award this could be quite variable.

DELIVERING THE PRESENTATION





Slide 4 5 minutes



Ist click: key question- what do all the children in the world have in common?

Ask audience for ideas. 'Rights' may be mentioned straightaway or later so be prepared to be adaptable here!

2nd click: their rights!

3rd click: working in pairs, ask children to briefly identify some children's rights and then ask for feedback on this.

Slide 5 3 *minutes*



Click to slide 5. If available hold up a large poster of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and explain that some time ago countries around the world agreed that all children should have these rights.

Mention some rights but also make clear that all rights are equally important.

Examples of rights include: the right to be safe, to have healthy food & clean water, to be heard & have views taken seriously, to relax & play, to be able to practise one's own beliefs and religion, to an education, 'to be the best we can be', to have a name, the right to privacy, to an adequate standard of living and not to be discriminated against.

NB there are 54 articles in the Convention. Articles 1-42 outline children's rights and Articles 43-54 are about how adults and governments must work together to make sure all children can enjoy all their rights, including Article 45 which refers to Unicef and other specialised agencies & UN organisations.
