

Build a Rights Around the World Passport

The Rights Around the World passport is a buildable month-by-month document that learners create to record and reflect on the project and stories they learn about through this series.

On the final slide of the pack, titled take your learning out into the world, you will find prompts that can be used to further the learning, and which can be added to your passport.

This is a flexible, learner-led piece which means that as educators you are free to tailor and adapt this activity to best suit the needs of your settings. However, you may wish to include a page or two for each topic for learners to document:

- A summary of the project or story featured that month. This could be a short piece of writing or a 'fact file' on the county and situation.
- Any actions or learning following the topic which you have explored that month, pupils could include a picture or drawing that shows this.

Examples might be:

- A short piece of writing about the project or story featured that month.
- A picture of your group taking an action based on the topic.
- An art idea based on learning from the topic.

Each learner could keep their own passport, or you could do one big passport for the whole class as a 'floor book' or similar. If you choose to do individual passports, it could be useful to create a booklet that includes enough pages to cover the whole series at the start of the year.

Each month's pack will have suggested activities, but you are welcome to respond and add to the passport in a way that feels most appropriate for your group.

You might want to add the rights that are most relevant to the learning that have taken place that month or the Sustainable Development Goal icons.

To create your passport, you will need:

- Templates for the passport cover and inner pages. We suggest using our templates which can be found on the Rights Around the World page on the RRSA website.
