International Day of Families

On 15 May, mark International Day of Families by celebrating Article 7 of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Ask students to invite parents, grandparents, carers and siblings to a picnic at your school to celebrate everyone's family – plus, use our **Day for Change recipes** to make special tasty treats.
