

Methodology	This survey has been conducted using an online interview administered to members of the YouGov Plc UK panel of 2.5 million+ individuals* who have agreed to take part in surveys. Emails are sent to panellists selected at random from the base sample. The e-mail invites them to take part in a survey and provides a generic survey link. Once a panel member clicks on the link they are sent to the survey that they are most required for, according to the sample definition and quotas. (The sample definition could be "GB adult population" or a subset such as "GB adult females"). Invitations to surveys don't expire and respondents can be sent to any available survey. The responding sample is weighted to the profile of the sample definition to provide a representative reporting sample. The profile is normally derived from census data or, if not available from the census, from industry accepted data.		

Our results are representative of parents with children age 0-4 in GB

Quotas were placed on region and social grade to reflect the proportion of parents with children age four and under in GB. The sample was then weighted to correct for any imbalances in the sample, with a weighting efficiency of 93. Separate quotas were placed on the Scottish boost to ensure this sample is representative of Scottish parents with children age four and under by social grade and region. We can report with confidence that the data represents parents with children age four and under.



What Worries Parents In 2024


Parents most commonly worry about their financial situation, in particular saving for the future and making ends meet (56% and 47% stated they worry all / a lot of the time).

Consequences Of Worries On Parents

9 in 10 (88%) say these worries impact their mental health in some way. Mood (53%), being angry and short-tempered (50%) and losing sleep (50%) was mentioned by half the parents who have worries.




How, if at all, do you feel these worries impact you?


Consequences Of Worries On Parenting


7 in 10 (71%) say their worries have an impact on their parenting. 4 in 10 say they have less patience with their child (43%) and 3 in 10 say they can be angry and short tempered with their child because of the worries they have (32%).



Mental Health Support

Only 1 in 10 (12%) received timely support and only 1 in 5 (20%) received any support at all.






If you have struggled with your mental health while being a parent, have you been able to access timely professional mental health support that addressed your needs?




Cost Of Living In 2024

Two-thirds (66%) of parents of 0-4 year olds say the rising cost-of-living has negatively impacted their family life.



COL Impacts On Family Life

4 in 10 who say cost-of-living has negatively impacted family life have cut down activities their children go to (43%), reduce their spending on books, toys or crafting material for their children (39%) and said that their household income has been reduced (39%).




You said the rising cost-of-living has negatively impacted your family life. In which, if any, of the following ways has it impacted you?

COL Impacts On Parenthood

Half of parents of 0-4 years (51%) are worried their children have fewer opportunities (e.g. education, holiday, activities) than they did. Over a third dread holidays because of financial strain (38%) and want to have another child but can't afford to (35%).



Financial Struggles


Almost half (46%) of all parents of 0-4 year olds say they've experienced at least one of the below financial struggles. A quarter (25%) have had to borrow money or gone into debt in order to make ends meet.

87% of parents of 0-4 year olds are very or somewhat worried about their child's future life chances





Biggest Challenges Facing Parents



Perceptions Of Childcare


9 in 10 (89%) of parents of 0-4 year olds think all young children and families have a right to access local, quality and affordable childcare when they need it.

Sentiment On Government Support

Around 2 in 3 (68%) parents of 0-4 year olds think the next UK government should provide more financial support to families with young children living on low incomes.

Income

Those with living with lower household incomes (£19,999 or below) struggle significantly more across a range of measures compared to the average, whereas those with higher incomes (£60,000+) struggle consistently less.
